

# Incorporating Global Perspectives to Achieve Patient-Centered Psychiatric Care

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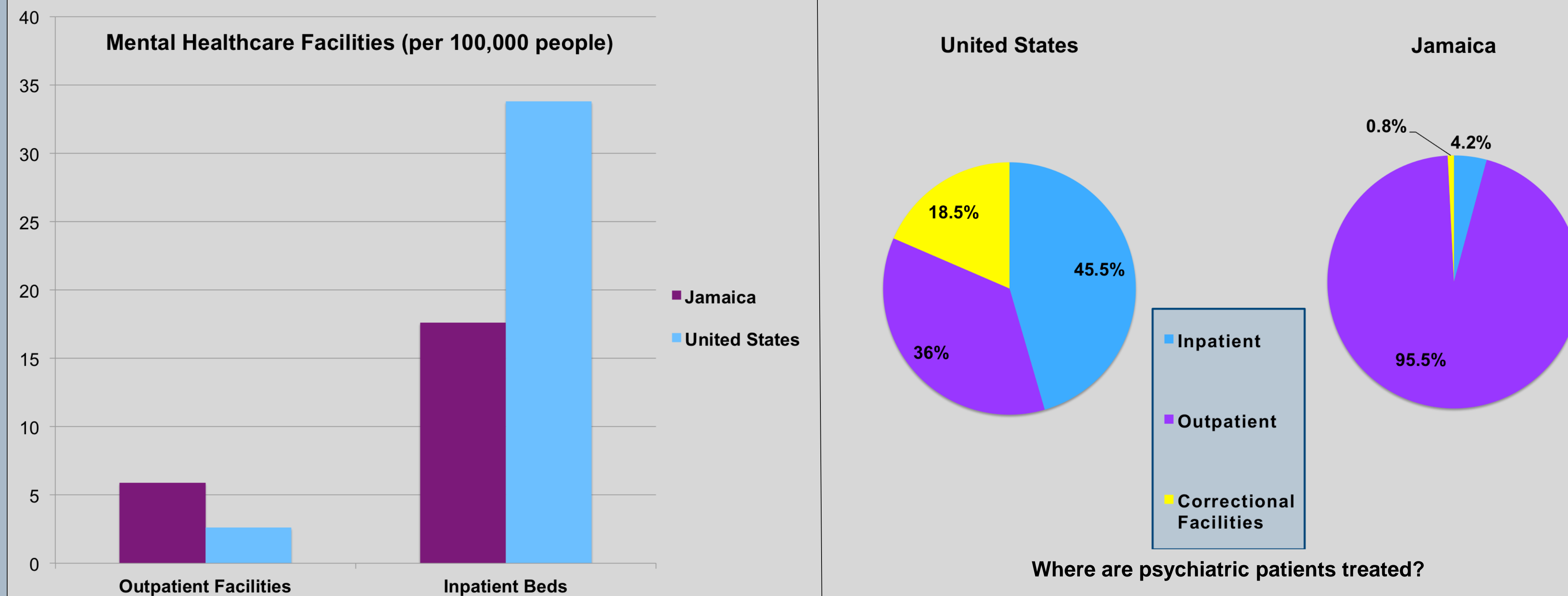
## Introduction

- Deinstitutionalization in the United States has failed to provide adequate access to patient-centered mental healthcare (Primeau, Bower, & Harrison, 2013)
- In Jamaica, community mental healthcare has expanded access, expenditures have been reduced, and inpatient hospital stays are shorter (WHO, 2011)

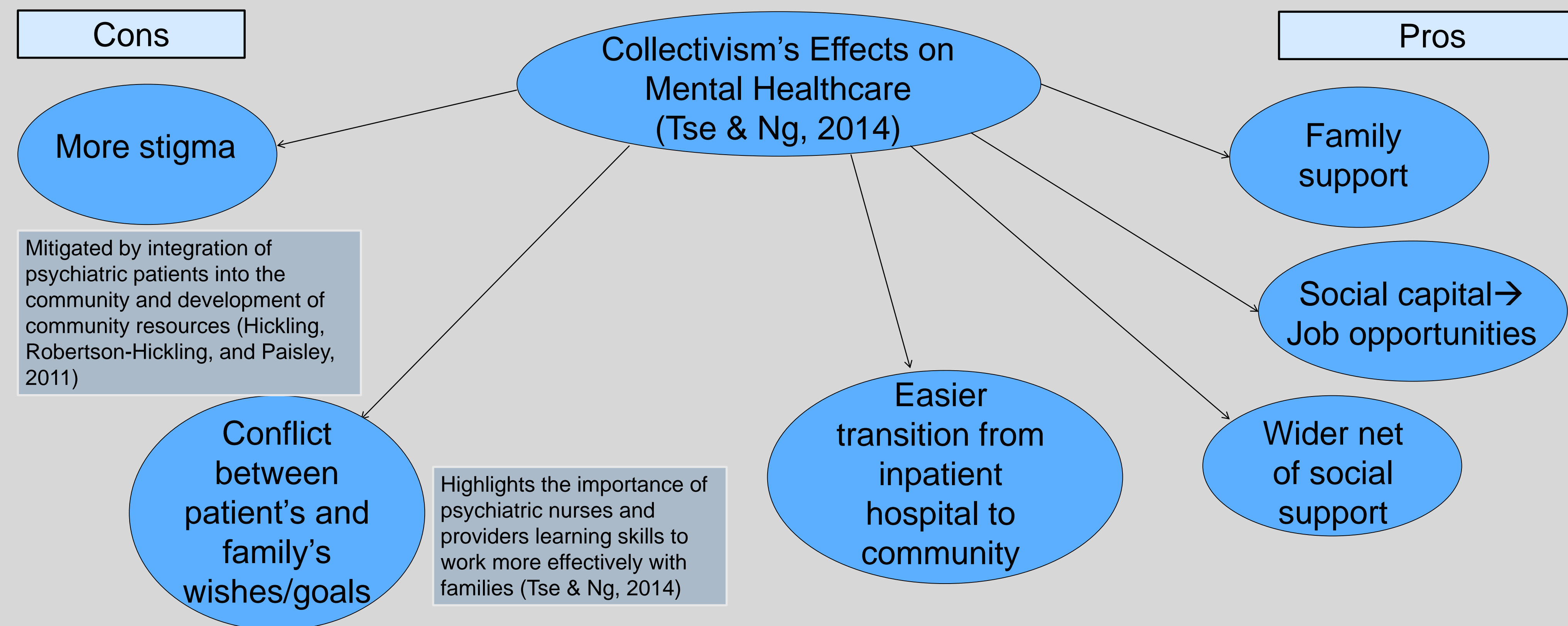
## Purpose

## Deinstitutionalization in Jamaica

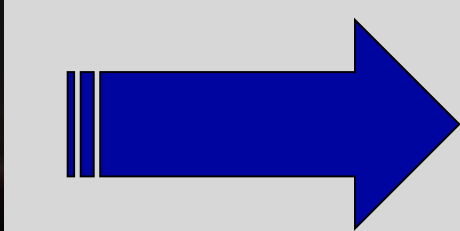


## Collectivism in Psychiatric Care
