

Facilitating Cultural Competence Through An Innovative International Collaborative Nursing Partnership

Cultural competence is the development of an awareness of another's culture, health beliefs, and characteristics that are different than one's own beliefs (Maltby, de Vries-Erich, & Lund, 2016).



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In a systematic review of 23 articles, it was found that there were not any established two-way exchange experiences in global pediatric nursing education, nor were there any models developed for clinical immersion exchange.

Mezirow's (2009) classic adult **Transformative Learning Theory** focuses on "disorienting dilemma" & reflection to understand new experience/culture

Mezirow's Ten Phases of Transformative Learning

- A disorienting dilemma
- A self examination with feelings of guilt or shame
- A critical assessment of epistemic, sociocultural, or psychic assumptions
- Recognition that one's discontent and the process of transformation are shared and that others have negotiated a similar change
- Exploration of options for new roles, relationships, and actions

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■ Bamber (2015) found Cosmopolitanism is the acquisition of becoming "other-wise" for gaining insight, cultural awareness, and cultural competence.

- Program was initiated through College of Health & Human Sciences (WCU) and Nursing, Midwifery, & Social Care (UK)












- Royal Hospital for Sick Children

- In existence for 10 years
- March Annually- USA students travel to Edinburgh for clinical mentoring immersions
- January Annually-Napier Students travel to USA for clinical mentoring experiences
- Individual guidelines




- Students range from pre-nursing, RN-BSN, BSN, Graduate, and DNS programs
- Total of USA 125 students over the ten year program
- Total of 25 UK students in exchange with USA clinical sites





A Collaborative Cultural Learning Model



- Prepares students for global awareness of pediatric nursing roles
- Clinical immersion & observation of nurses
- Self-directed learning experiences
- Student presentations of global health problems to student and nursing peers in March in Edinburgh
- Students mentored in all areas of peds. units






- Students learn to appreciate similarities
 & differences in Peds.
 Care in both countries
- Students share care knowledge
- Students learn leadership roles of nurses in both countries
- Students learn cultural differences in UK & in US with Cherokee Pediatrics



- Cherokee-Home to 15,000 native people
- Scotland students visit hospital, pediatric clinics, family/maternity clinics, & diabetes
- Travel with home health nurses












- Students from Scotland enjoy clinical mentoring immersions also at **Mission Health** Hospital throughout **Pediatric units and Clinics**
- Huff ambulatory site-outpatient





- Recommendations for university educators and clinical faculty:
- Planning: Begin one year in advance (allows students to save money for the excursion)



- Professional **Educational Travel** Company: Recommend using company to guide faculty in preparing travel arrangements/ meals/lodging/
- Collection of funds, passports



- International Learning contracts: Allow six to nine months to allow university/clinical administration/and attorneys to review and approve
- One year minimum



Facilitating Cultural Competence Through An Innovative International Collaborative Nursing Partnership

Internal **Collaborative** Partnership: Allow one year to develop clinical partnership for educational and clinical partnership with universities and clinical agencies



- Orientation:
- Prepare students for acceptance of a new country, culture, language, customs, and clinical approach to nursing
- Once in a lifetime experience!



- The Collaborative Pediatric International Cultural Learning and Mentoring Program continues to be successful
- Educational Foundation in Nursing
- Faculty have published two articles in three international journals about program!
