

Specific Aim

Aim: Determine how adolescents with siblings with autism perceive their family functioning

Research Questions

Research Question 1: How do adolescents who have a sibling with autism perceive that their family is functioning as measured by Family Assessment Device (FAD)?

Research Question 2: Do the perceptions of family functioning of adolescents who have siblings with autism differ by age and gender?

Design and Sample

Exploratory, correlational design
Inclusion criteria
11-20 years of age
Have a sibling with autism
Have sufficient command of English language
Have access to a computer with internet
Exclusion criteria
History of developmental or language delay






