A gap exists that addresses the health behaviors of **Generation Z students** in **Black sororities and fraternities** 








### The Divine 9

- All about technology
- Enjoys other people
- Competitive
- Welcoming of change
- Diversity is all they've known
- Independent

#### Divine 9

- Emphasis on respect, character, and holding oneself to a high standard
- Community-seeking; creating positive and intentional connections with others
- Life-long allegiances
- Rich with proud tradition

## Purpose

Describe findings from our pilot study:

- explored the health, safety, and risk behaviors
- Generation Z students
- active within Black university-sponsored sororities and fraternities.





#### Methods



Qualitative phenomenology

- Data collection methods:
  - unannounced observation
     of human group behaviors
  - windshield surveys
  - individual interviews
- Data analysis guided by Colaizzi's (1978) seven-step method, using NVivo software

#### Results

Identified themes center upon the role of Black sorority/fraternity social influences on members':

#### **Risk-Related Behaviors:**

- Drinking behaviors
- Substance and E-Cigarette patterns of use

# Health-Related Decision-Making Factors:

- Eating and physical activity
- Active involvement in community service and outreach

### Discussion



Individuals with strong, loyal identifications to Greek life as part of his/her overall sense of self can be powerfully influenced by their organization, thus affecting multiple facets of living, decision-making, and sharing of experiences.
