ASPIRE to Excellence: A Mentoring Academy for Evidence-Based Practice Christene A. Taylor, MSN, RN, CEN

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Purpose:

Our evidence-based clinical ladder promotes professional development by empowering nurses to recognize and communicate the difference they make for patient outcomes. The ASPIRE Academy was created to mentor the nurse from project development through dissemination (Saletnik, 2018). Nurses are engaging in unit projects but articulate a lack of confidence in data collection, significance, and the ability to link their work to outcomes (Friesen et al., 2017).

Methods:

Implementing monthly workshops called the ASPIRE Academy to help support the clinical nurses with their evidence-based projects. A curriculum was developed around different topics regarding ASPIRE including: What is ASPIRE?, Building a PICOT question, Awareness of resources for Literature Review, Completing ASPIRE application, PDCA cycle for interventions, Collecting data, Building your portfolio, and mentorship (Melnyk, 2016). Curriculum subject matter experts involved in the education include Nursing Professional Development Specialist, Director of Nursing, and other experts. This workshop started with one critical access hospital and has been expanded to include other hospitals in the region. Results:

The need for this project was based on feedback from nursing leaders and clinical staff who were not aware of the ASPIRE program. In 2018, there were no applications for the ASPIRE project. There are no completed projects to date. Goal was to increase applications and completed projects for the region by July 31, 2020. Development of the program started in October 2019. The first ASPIRE Academy was held in December of 2019. Currently there are 7 ASPIRE projects in different stages of completion and 3 application under review.

Conclusion:

As the complexity of healthcare grows, it is imperative for frontline nurses to use evidence-based practice at the bedside (CHIEN, 2019). Participation in the Academy empowers nurses to utilize best practice, innovation, and initiative to drive organizational performance. Through the program, the nurse is confident in their knowledge and skill to analyze and utilize data to improve daily work and drive optimal patient outcomes (Washington, 2018).
