

Olga M. Church, RN, PhD, (Alpha Lambda), a member of the Heritage Committee of Sigma Theta Tau, is President of the American Association for the History of Nursing and Director of the Midwest Nursing History Resource Center, housed at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She has published extensively on topics in nursing history.

Jacqueline Clinton, RN, PhD, FAAN, (Rho) Associate Professor and Director of the Center for Nursing Research and Evaluation at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee is the Principal Investigator for an Expectant Father Study funded by the Division of Nursing and Project Site Director for a HFCA/ANA study on DRG Refinement for Nursing Care. Her Expectant Father Study has been the subject of a recent New York Times article. In addition to Associated Press distribution, her work has been featured on "Good Morning, America" and Cable News Network (CNN). She believes that "almost every nursing research project has a human interest aspect that would interest the news media and the public."

W. Lee Conant, Jr., MA, described as "always on the leading edge: a growth person, an experimenter, an inventor," co-founded Conant Associates of Salt Lake City, one of the leading interior design firms in the country. Mr. Conant's holistic approach to marketing and design has been especially valued by Sigma Theta Tau with whom he has been a frequent consultant over the past ten years.

Donna Diers, RN, MSN, FAAN (Delta Mu) is a Professor and former Dean of Nursing at Yale University; she is one of the few nurses active in the Institute of Medicine and currently serves as Associate Editor of IMAGE: The Journal of Nursing Scholarship. Her article on "nursing as metaphor," which has been reprinted several times, offers a well written expression of nursing in the 80s. Professor Diers, who has long expressed the need to communicate nursing to the general community, has demonstrated a growing involvement with social policy issues.

M. Patricia Donahue, R.N., Ph.D., (Gamma), is the author of Nursing: The Finest Art, a new book published by Mosby, which presents a history of nursing through text and art. In addition to her interest in historical nursing research, Dr. Donahue's clinical areas of interest focus on oncology and terminal illness.

Sister Rosemary Donley, RN, PhD, FAAN, (Kappa), currently Dean of the School of Nursing has been named Executive Vice President at The Catholic University of America effective Fall, 1986. President of Sigma Theta Tau from 1974-1981, she is actively involved in health legislation and policy, and served as a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow in 1977. Sr. Rosemary is known for providing stimulating and insightful challenges to nurses. She recently received an honorary doctorate from Villanova University.

Rhetaugh Graves Dumas, RN, PhD, FAAN, (Rho) was the first nurse to be appointed Deputy Director of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). Currently Professor and Dean at the University of Michigan School of Nursing, Dr. Dumas has published extensively on leadership issues, especially as they pertain to black nurses. She has received honorary doctorates from Simmons College and the University of Cincinnati.

Vernice Ferguson, RN, MA, FAAN, (Kappa) currently is serving as President-Elect of Sigma Theta Tau and will be installed as President at the 28th Biennial Convention in Indianapolis. In her role as Deputy Assistant Chief Medical Director for Nursing Programs and Director, Nursing

Service of the Veterans Administration, she heads the nation's largest nursing service, which includes nearly 60,000 nursing personnel. She is a Faculty Associate in the School of Nursing at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. Ms. Ferguson has also been the recipient of numerous honors—including the prestigious Royal College of Nursing Fellowship and the 1985 Jean MacVicar Outstanding Nurse Executive Award from the National League for Nursing.

Michael Finley has worked with associations and professional groups on image cultivation and improvement for over 15 years. In his work as a public relations professional, he served as a consultant for the Yale University of Nursing. He is currently collaborating with Dr. Jacqueline Clinton on a trade paperback, The Pregnant Man: Stress and the Expectant Father.

Irma Goertzen, RN, MN, FAAN (Psi), Administrator of the University of Washington Hospital, is one of a handful of women hospital administrators in the country. She holds a faculty appointment at the University's Department of Community Health Care Systems. In 1985, she was honored by the Seattle professional chapter of women in communication as a "Woman in Achievement."

Betsy Harris has been Fashion Editor at the Indianapolis Star since 1983. A journalism graduate of the University of Miami, she has been generally interested in nursing. In addition, she is involved as a community volunteer with the Junior League of Indianapolis, Children's Musuem, and Indianapolis Museum of Art.

Mary Moyars Johnson, MA, has worked with Indiana legislators, assisting them in preparing to meet the public. Her work has helped to demonstrate an extensive need for this kind of assistance for all professionals. She is Publisher of Oubache Press and Coordinator of Alumni Relations School of Humanities, Social Services and Education at Purdue University.

Lucie Young Kelly, RN, PhD, FAAN, (Alpha Zeta), Professor of Public Health and Nursing at Columbia University, currently is serving a term as President of Sigma Theta Tau. As Editor of Nursing Outlook and the author of the best-selling Dimensions in Professional Nursing, Dr. Kelly exemplifies the belief that the success of Sigma Theta Tau lies in its human resources. She challenges each of us as nurses to make sure "that we are not just abreast, but ahead of societal and professional trends." She has received honorary doctorates from University of Rhode Island, Georgetown University and Widener College, Chester, PA.

Angela Barron McBride, RN, PhD, FAAN, (Alpha) is the First Vice-President of Sigma Theta Tau. The author of two books, The Growth and Development of Mothers, and Living with Contradictions: A Married Feminist, she is also published widely in professional journals and popular magazines, and is working on third book, Letting Go: The Second Decade of Parenthood. Dr. McBride has received several honors including the 1983 ANA Council of Specialists in Psychiatric and Mental Health Nursing Award for Current Impact in Research and Scholarship, and the 1985 Distinguished Researcher Award for the Midwest Nursing Research Society.

Ronald D. Norby, R.N., M.S.N., (Psi), is the Chief of Nursing Service of the largest Veterans Administration Hospital in the country. One of many countinuing programs with an emphasis on image building is the publication of "HinesSight," a newsletter distributed to hospitals throughout the country.

Roger W. Reed, RNC, (Alpha) utilized his experience as a Family Nurse Practicioner to develop a new health promotion-based model for employee health services at Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Indiana. He has recently completed a Kellogg-funded study evaluating the impact of health promotion services. He stresses the need for nursing to "get in tune with standard business practices with regard to health promotion and wellness."

Dan Rutz is a medical news correspondent for Cable News Newtork's "News from Medicine," a segment airing several times daily. He also anchors "Healthweek," a weekly overview of major medical storeis that airs weekends. Born in Milwaukee, he holds a B.S. degree in speech and broadcasting from the University of Wisconsin. He is an emergency medical technician and has augmented his duties as a medical correspondent with features on nursing researchers and the public

No. Theresa Schaefer, RN, BSN, (Gamma), Sigma Theta Tau Region 2
Coordinator, has designed and implemented a project to improve the image of nursing in lowa. The project has involved the development of a statewide network of recommended nurse experts to serve with University of lowa nursing faculty as sources for news articles on consumer-oriented health subjects. Interest in the media project has increased to 250 contributors since its initiation in the fall of 1981. In addition, Schaefer has been able to communicate information regarding the nurse's image, role and productivity through different media sources such as radio and TV.
