Highlights from the 29th Biennial Convention

The 1987 Biennial Convention in San Francisco, "Celebrate Worldwide Nursing Scholarship," provided many reasons and events for celebration to nearly 1,200 nursing professionals from around the country and the world. The convention was a week full of activity, scholarship, networking and festivity in the beautiful Golden Gate City. Highlights of Sigma Theta Tau International's 29th Biennial Convention include:

Writers' Workshop. A Pre-Convention feature on Monday, November 9, 1987, was the Writers' Workshop, "Scholarly Writing for Publication," featuring Donna Diers, RN, MSN, Editor of IMAGE: Journal of Nursing Scholarship. Ms. Diers offered an intensive, four-hour workshop on writing and getting published. The workshop, which had exceptional reviews, drew over 120 participants.

Scientific Sessions. Scientific Sessions Day, which was held on November 10, 1987 set a new record; there were 933 participants making this the largest nursing research conference of its kind to date. The keynote address—"Pandemic Images: Empowerment through Knowledge Development," presented by Afaf Meleis, RN, PhD, FAAN, was very well received. Poster presentations (78), symposia presentations (14) and scientific paper presentations (108) of completed nursing research on a variety of current health issues filled most of the day.

Newcomers' Luncheon. This luncheon, which was a first for Sigma Theta Tau, was held on Tuesday, November 10, 1987, for first-time Convention Delegates. There were over 330 attendees who were presented with information on the uniqueness of a Sigma Theta Tau Convention, an explanation of material in their delegate packets and an overview of the week's activities.

Public Reception. The art of nursing was celebrated at a reception for Sigma Theta Tau members and the San Francisco community on Tuesday evening, November 10, 1987. A number of distinguished leaders from the civic and nursing community met with Sigma Theta Tau members bringing the number in attendance to over 425. A slide presentation "Celebrate Nursing Art a reflection of social reality" was presented by M. Patricia Donahue, Sigma Theta Tau 1985 Grand Media Award winner. Reverend John Lo Schiavo, S.J., President of the University of San Francisco, acknowledged nursing's unique contributions to health care and Sigma Theta Tau's contributions to nursing.

Exhibits. The Exhibit Hall provided convention attendees the opportunity to learn of new products and services in the health care market. A total of 42 exhibitors participated in this year's convention. In addition, 61 chapters, regions and petitioning chapters also participated.

Forty-Two New Chapters. Forty-two petitioning chapters, including three chapters outside the United States, were approved to be chartered! These three include: University of Western Ontario, Republic of China at Large and Korea at Large. An air of excitement filled the room as designates from these new chapters proceeded to the platform, carrying their country's flag. A Recognition Luncheon recognizing the chapter designates, their mentor chapters and the services of officers and volunteers followed the Friday House of Delegates meeting.

Awards Presented. An exciting aspect of Convention was the presentation of numerous awards to many worthy individuals. The Founders Awards and Mentor Award presentations were made at an elegant Awards Banquet with over 500 in attendance on Wednesday evening, November 11, 1987. The 1987 Media Awards were presented at a luncheon on November 12, 1987.

Honorary Members Inducted. Five outstanding individuals were inducted as Honorary Members of Sigma Theta Tau International. They were: Jose R. Coronado, Sandra G. Funk, Margaret E. Kuhn, Doris H. Merritt and Diane J. Skiba. Honorary membership in Sigma Theta Tau recognizes persons who have significantly contributed to nursing scholarship or a field contributing to scholarly nursing endeavors.

Bylaws changed. Two major bylaw amendments were adopted by the House of Delegates. *First*, a new standing committee, the Publications Committee, has been established to oversee the organization's communication plan and make recommendations to the Governing Council. The Publications Committee shall be responsible for the overall direction, quality and production guidelines of the society's publications. The committee shall consist of four appointed members and the secretary as an ex-officio member.

Second, the active membership fee was increased from \$20.00 to \$25.00 to assist in maintaining programs, publications and service to the increased members and chapters.

House of Delegate Resolutions. One: Sigma Theta Tau International acknowledges, endorses and supports those women who served in the Vietnam War, and urges nurses and others to assist and aid the Vietnam Women's Memorial Project in attaining its goals. Individuals interested in contacting the project for information or to make contributions should write to Vietnam Women's Memorial Project, 511 Eleventh Avenue South, Minneapolis, MN 55415. system at the local, national and international levels. In addition, the officers, staff of Sigma Theta Tau, Arrangements Committee and Program Committee were also thanked for their service and dedication.

New President Elected. Elections were held on Thursday, November 12 to select the Sigma Theta Tau leaders for the next biennium. Dr. Billye Brown, *Epsilon Theta*, from the University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing was chosen President-Elect.

Memories of the 29th Biennial Convention have not yet begun to fade; however, plans are underway for the 30th Biennial Convention to be held November 13-17, 1989 in Indianapolis, Indiana. An invitation has also been accepted for the 1991 Convention which will be held in Tampa, Florida. Host chapters are *Delta Beta*, U. of South Florida, and *Beta Tau*, U. of Miami.

Founders Awards Recognize Superior Achievement

The Founders Awards were presented at a special banquet during Convention. A Founders Award is the highest honor bestowed by Sigma Theta Tau. They recognize the excellence of contemporary nursing leaders and honor individuals and chapters for superior achievement. Named in honor of each of the six founders of Sigma Theta Tau and the director of Indiana University School of Nursing in 1922, the Awards symbolize the qualities of personal leadership which motivated the founders and pay tribute to their vision.

ADA K. JACOX, *Pi*—The Dorothy Garrigus Adams Award for High Professional Standards.

Ada K. Jacox, RN, PhD, FAAN, Professor and Director, Center for Nursing Research, University of Maryland School of Nursing, has epitomized a philosophy of excellence in fostering professional standards throughout her nursing career. She was commended for exceptional service to the American Nurses' Foundation after serving as President and on the Board of Trustees. She has been recognized by the National Academy of Science's Committee on National Needs for Biomedical and Behavioral Research Personnel.

ELOISE LEWIS, Gamma Theta, and THERESA M. VALIGA, Alpha Nu—The Elizabeth Russell Belford Award for Excellence in Education.

Eloise Lewis, RN, EdD, FAAN, is Professor Emeritus, University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she served as Dean of the School of Nursing for 19 years and initiated its MSN Program. She was a charter fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, and served until 1979 as a member of its Governing Council. She is the only nurse in the North Carolina state system to receive the Oliver Max Gardner Award given to the member of the faculty of the consolidated University of North Carolina who made the greatest contribution to the welfare of the human race.

Theresa M. Valiga, RN, EdD, is Associate Professor, College of Nursing, Villanova University, Villanova, Pennsylvania. Her professional activities have consistently promoted her goal of a theory/ research base for nursing curricula and nursing practice. One of her outstanding strengths is her ability to influence the scholarly development of others through support of both students and peers using challenges and extensive feedback both in and out of the classroom.

DELTA MU CHAPTER, YALE UNIVERSITY—The Ethel Palmer Clarke Award for Chapter Programming.

Delta Mu is a chapter whose creative chapter activities and programs serve as a model for all chapters. Fundraising and programming activities enable the chapter to provide an annual educational scholarship to a chapter member furthering his/her professional education in nursing. Since 1984, 12 nurse researchers have been funded through research grants. The chapter promotes nursing practice by sponsoring several local and national programs each year.

MARY OPAL WOLANIN, Beta Mu-The Edith Moore Copeland Award for Creativity.

Mary Opal Wolanin, RN, MPA, FAAN, is Associate Professor Emeritus, College of Nursing, University of Arizona. Since 1978, her writings, and particularly the book "Confusion: Prevention and Care," have had 20 citations in scholarly journals, both nationally and internationally. She is referred to as the "Johnnie Appleseed" of Geriatric Nursing because of her push to identify geriatrics as a distinct area of clinical nursing practice.

MARIE C. PHANEUF, Gamma Gamma—The Marie Hippensteel Lingeman Award for Excellence in Nursing Practice.

Marie C. Phaneuf, RN, MA, FAPHA, is Professor Emeritus, Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan. Following her work with the Associated Hospital Service of New York (Blue Cross) in the 1950's, the New York State insurance law was revised in 1959 to permit insurance plans to pay for home care. An additional result of her work by late 1964 showed more than half of the Blue Cross Plans in the United States provided payment for visiting nurse care. For over 20 years her work has been associated with quality assurance and evaluation of care, and has been used by other health care professionals besides nurses.

KATHRYN BARNARD, Psi and ADA SUE HINSHAW, BetaMu—The Elizabeth McWilliams Miller Award for Excellence in Research.

Kathryn Barnard, RN, PhD, is a Professor in Parent/Child Nursing, University of Washington. She and her research team currently are engaged in three nursing research projects funded by grants from the Division of Nursing, HRA, PHS, NIMH, Department of Health and Human Services, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. From 1981 through 1986, Dr. Barnard authored the "Keys to Research" column in the American Journal of Maternal Child Nursing.

Ada Sue Hinshaw, RN, PhD, FAAN, is the first Director of the National Center for Nursing Research, a major new NIH component. She spent 12 years on the staff of the University of Arizona College of Nursing; she served as Director of Research and Professor at the College of Nursing while concurrently serving as Director of Nursing Research in the Nursing Department of Arizona's Health Sciences Center. The author of over 80 published papers, book chapters and abstracts, she was honored in 1985 with the American Nurses' Association's Nurse Scientist of the Year Award.

MYRTLE K. AYDELOTTE, Gamma and LUCILE PETRY LEONE, Alpha Eta—The Mary Tolle Wright Award for Leadership.

Myrtle K. Aydelotte, RN, PhD, FAAN, is Professor and Dean Emeritus, College of Nursing, University of Iowa. In 1940 she became the first Dean of the College of Nursing at the University of Iowa and the first woman academic dean on campus. She conducted a landmark study at the University of Iowa, "The Investigation of the Relationship Between Nursing Activity and Patient Welfare." Currently, as an American Nurses' Foundation Scholar, she is conducting a survey of nurses who practice in non-traditional settings in the United States.

Lucile Petry Leone, RN, MA, is Professor Emeritus, University of California, San Francisco School of Nursing. At the age of 85, in her third formal retirement, she serves as consultant to the University of California San Francisco School of Nursing for international students and visitors. She participates on the research review committee of a local medical center, and is active in professional issues, speaking both locally and nationally. She has held leadership roles in The American Public Health Association, The World Health Organization and the Institute of Medicine.

JOSE R. CORONADO, Hospital Director, Audie L. Murphy Memorial Veterans Hospital, San Antonio, Texas. Mr. Coronado is Executive Officer of one of the most complex tertiary care and referral medical centers in the largest health care system in the United States. His 11-year hospital administration career in the Veterans' Administration has brought national recognition to him within his profession and the profession of nursing.

SANDRA G. FUNK, Associate Professor, Director of Research Support Center, Carrington Hall/School of Nursing, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Funk's contributions to nursing as a teacher, consultant and researcher show her commitment to nursing and to Sigma Theta Tau International's goals. She has distinguished herself in the fields of psychometrics, social psychology and child development. thers in Philadelphia, an organization devoted to the eradication of ageism in the United States. Dr. Harriet H. Werley was presented the Mentor Award at the Biennial Convention Awards Banquet. Harriet Werley, RN, PhD, FAAN, is Distinguished Professor, School of Nursing, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. From her World War II oversees duty with the United States Army Nurse Corps, through service with the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research Department of Atomic Casualties Studies and with the Eighth Army Headquarters in Korea before moving to the collegiate scene, Dr. Werley has used the opportunity to serve as mentor to her nursing colleagues. Among many other awards and recognitions, she was a charter fellow of the American Academy of Nursing; she received the Pfizer Award of Merit on behalf of the US Defense Council in 1960 and the Army Commendation Medal the following year.

The Mentor Award was contributed by Dr. Ruth Kuehn in honor of Dr. Lucie Kelly to further mentoring.

Information Resources Technology Awards

The first Information Resources Technology Awards were presented at a luncheon during the Biennial Convention to recognize individual and group achievements in sharing knowledge through advanced technology.

- Kathryn Barnard, Georgina Sumner and Robert E. Hoehn, University of Washington, Seattle, Washington. For their outstanding series of programs designed to disseminate new nursing research through the use of communication satellite technology.

Utilization Of Research In Nursing Practice Awards

Joann Eland, University of Iowa College of Nursing, Iowa City, Iowa, received the first Utilization of Research in Nursing Practice Award for pioneering the development of a projective technique for pain assessment in children by asking the child to communicate degrees of pain through colored drawings.

Mary Ann Sweeney (University of Texas-Galveston), Claire Gulino (San Diego State), Mary Anne Small (San Diego State) and Josefina Meza Lora (Escuela de Enfermeria, Clinica #20 del IMSS, Tijuana BC, Mexico) received the group award for their project titled "Cross-Cultural Nursing in the Border Community." This project provides preventative health education in community health centers serving low-income, multi-ethnic populations and then delivers the information using popular forms of media. The program can be accessed in either Spanish or English.

Grand Media Award Winner

Joyce Oebker, a TV reporter in Birmingham, Alabama (Region 3) received the Grand Media Award for her five-part TV series, "A Crisis of Care." The series was aired on the 10 o'clock news program on WBRC-TV in Birmingham, July 24-28, 1987. The series examined topics related to the shortage of nurses in practice, the drop in enrollment in schools of nursing, rewards and perils of the nursing profession, unique opportunities for nurses, and the future of nursing.

Center for Nursing Scholarship's Site Selected!

The International Center for Nursing Scholarship will be located at the site of its 1922 founding, on the northeast corner of the Indiana University campus, adjacent to a lovely park and fountain.

"For more than a year, Sigma Theta Tau has actively investigated building sites in this central location, marked by impressive urban redevelopment projects, as well as renovation and beautification of a canal transversing the city of Indianapolis," says Executive Officer Nell Watts. "The site at Indiana University meets our need to be close to downtown, the international airport and Indianapolis University. We will benefit from the ability to use IU's new conference center and Lincoln Hotel, and from interaction with the diverse health, education and research activities conducted at the university."

The recent creation of the Indiana University Center for Philanthropy, containing major components of the Fund Raising School, will also benefit Sigma Theta Tau Headquarters staff and members, according to Mrs. Watts. Placement of the International Center for Nursing Scholarship on the northeast corner of its campus not only fits the long-range architectural master plan of Indiana University, but also enhances the institution's scientific and research base, according to university officials.

Sigma Theta Tau and representatives of Indiana University are now working toward completing a suitable arrangement for long-term lease of the land necessary for the Center. An "Agreement Preliminary to a Lease" was approved by the IU Architectural Committee and Board of Trustees on December 4, 1987.

Sigma Theta Tau's architectural firm, Howard, Needles, Tammen & Bergendoff, will now begin to prepare a more comprehensive building design. Site preparations and actual construction will begin early in the summer of 1988; the Center will be dedicated in November of 1989 at the Society's Biennial Convention. Date for the dedication has been scheduled for Wednesday, November 15, 1989.

Arista '87 Monograph The Nursing Shortage "Nurses and the Delivery of Health Care Services"

ARISTA '87 convened in Washington, D.C. in August, marked the first "think tank" conference of Sigma Theta Tau International. It focused on a single, yet critical issue affecting nurses, nursing and the *delivery of health care services* to the public now and in the foreseeable future.

The increasing demand for nursing services at a time of recognized shortage; of available nurses and declining enrollments in schools of nursing are concerns which deserve our best thinking in a relatively structure-free forum. The chronic nursing shortage and the cyclical exacerbations such as the one which is being experienced in a strikingly changed health care environment not only require the focused attention of the nursing profession but its many publics as well. At Arista '87 a select group of nurses engaged in discussion about the state-of-the profession and strategies for the future of nursing. Following their deliberations they were joined by a group of nonnurse influentials who reacted to the group's deliberations and offered their ideas as well.

This monograph is one of the outcomes of the conference. It is hoped that it will stimulate your thinking as you become involved in thoughtful action as the complexity of these issues continues to be addressed.
