# **Assembly Season Closes**

igma Theta Tau International concluded a successful Regional Assembly season which provided professional stimulation, leadership development and networking opportunities with nursing and chapter leaders. The Region 4 Assembly was held April 24-25, in Ann Arbor, Michigan, marking the close of the seven Regional Assemblies. The first of the assemblies was held in Omaha, Nebraska on October 24-25, 1986.

In Omaha, Nebraska; Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; New Orleans, Louisiana; Honolulu, Hawaii; Tampa, Florida; Hartford, Connecticut; and Ann Arbor, Michigan, over 3,000 Sigma Theta Tau chapter leaders and nurse scholars gathered to pattern their successes, to learn the culture building strategies of successful corporations and to identify rituals, heroes and values that provide direction for quality patient care.

Sigma Theta Tau President Vernice Ferguson provided an exciting keynote address at each of the assemblies and challenged members to move to the forefront in the nursing profession. Third Vice President Doris Edwards focused Sigma Theta Tau leaders toward the implication of various leadership styles with a focus on women, as she keynoted the Leadership Session for the assemblies.

A popular activity during the 1986-87 Regional Assemblies was the Leadership Session where chapter representatives shared the wide range of creative activities of their chapters with other chapters. It was clearly apparent that Sigma Theta Tau members are pioneers in the nursing profession and are innovative and creative in their efforts on campus and in their communities.

A Media Awards Luncheon was held at each of the assemblies where awards were presented to winners in their respective regions. The media awards recognize outstanding coverage of nursing issues presented by the public media and by the nursing media.

Those in attendance at each of the Regional Assemblies had an opportunity to be updated on international chapter development and on the progress of the Knowledge Building Campaign. At each assembly an added focus was on fundraising for the International Center for Nursing Scholarship and for individual and chapter (Additional Regional Assembly photos on p. 5) research.

# "Ask the Nurse"

Information is power and power is influence. Increasingly, nurses seek out other nurses as peer-to-peer consultation takes place. Similarly, other health care providers look to nurses as information sources. The true test comes when the public re-

gards health information from nurses as important to them as they make informed decisions.

I am heartened by two such accounts from the popular press. Diane Hales in an article, "Deadly Doctors," which appeared in *Woman's Day*, November 11, 1986, sug-

President Ferguson Keynotes Program

Sigma Theta Tau President Vernice Ferguson, Deputy Assistant Chief Medical Director for Nursing Programs & Director, Nursing Service of the Veterans Administration, keynoted the Second Nurses in Washington Internship Program, sponsored by the National Federation of Specialty Nursing Organizations (NFSNO), on March 3, 1987 in Washington, D.C. Guest organizations participating this year were the National Association of Health Care Recruiters, the National Gerontological Nursing Association and the Nurses Organization of the Veterans Administration.

gested that you "ask the nurse" when you are choosing a good doctor as your defense against a deadly one. She offers nine guidelines, two of which call upon the nurse. Hales advises that you ask the head nurse and chief resident in medicine or pediatrics whom they would choose to care for their loved ones. Before any operation, the author continues, investigate surgeons. Once again she advises, ask hospital nurses and residents whom they would choose for your kind of surgery.

Dr. Kathleen McCormick, a nurse and physiologist, determined that in tests of heart and lung function during sustained deep breathing, the hearts of singers worked more efficiently and heart rates were lower than those in a group of nonsingers under forty years of age. Study subjects were between twenty-eight and

sixty-five years old, some of whom smoked and some never exercised. The cardio-pulmonary differences paralleled those of conditioned athletes and untrained subjects during exercise testing. Dr. McCormick suggests that enthusiastic song is one way to hold off declining heart and lung function that comes with aging. These findings were reported on the health page of the January 1987 Vogue magazine.

Consumers of health care have a need to know as they make decisions about their health, the providers and payment for services rendered. Nurses have an obligation to build on the information that is known. The public should continue to "ask the nurse" with full confidence in the information imparted.

Have the nurse do it is an old and common refrain. "Ask the nurse" heralds a new day befitting the public's acknowledgement of nurses' contribution to health care.

# **President-elect Authors Issue**

Sigma Theta Tau President-elect Angela Barron McBride had her article, "The National Center for Nursing Research," published in the Social Policy Report, a quarterly publication of the Society for Research in Child Development.

Each issue of the Social Policy Report focuses on a single policy topic affecting children or youth, and includes analyses of both existing or pending legislation and the contribution of research in the evolution of that legislative program. While presented from the social policy perspective, these reports highlight the role of social science research in the development of public programs. References include both scientific and policy citations, and sources for further information are provided.

The current issue, authored by Angela Barron McBride, is on the establishment of the National Center for Nursing Research. Forthcoming issues later this year will address high school drop-outs and day care. Previous issues have been on: Child Abuse, Adolescent Pregnancy, Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Children and Television, Bilingual Education and Juvenile Justice.

# Health Promotion Focus of Wingspread Conference

"Conceptual Issues in Health Promotion Research" was the focus of Wingspread Conference sponsored by the Johnson Foundation in Racine, Wisconsin on April 13–15, 1987. Sigma Theta Tau was a co-sponsor of the conference, along with the Department of Mental Health, Community and Administrative Nursing, University of California-San Francisco; Northern Illinois University School of Nursing; and the Midwest Nursing Research Society. The conference provided an opportunity for discussion of the theoretical and methodological issues encountered in generating knowledge about human health and health enhancement throughout the lifespan. Nurse researchers and other health scientists with expertise in health and health promotion participated in the forum.

Topics presented for discussion as focii for emerging research agen-

das include: human health patterns throughout the lifespan, differences and similarities between health promotion and disease prevention, dilemmas in studying health as individual change phenomena, dilemmas in studying health as social change phenomena, and methodological issues in the study of health as a holistic state. Thought-provoking plenary sessions as well as small group discussions facilitated efforts in exploring substantive theory and research issues in health promotion.

The conference was timely considering efforts by the federal government now underway to address health objectives for the nation for the year 2000. Developments in health promotion research will be critical to understanding health behaviors of diverse populations and to developing a viable health care agenda for the future. Sigma Theta Tau will publish proceedings of the Conference.

# Saba to Address Research Luncheon at NLN

Virginia K. Saba, RN, EdD, Tau, Georgetown U., a well-known nursing information systems expert, will address Sigma Theta Tau members during the Research Luncheon scheduled Wednesday, June 17 at the National League for Nursing Convention in Washington, D.C. Theme of the Research Luncheon will be Sigma Theta Tau's International Classification System of Nursing Knowledge and uses for the nurse researcher.

Dr. Saba, who has utilized the system in classifying major research grants, will provide an overview of the system as well as a critique and recommendations for future use. She will address the need for nursing knowledge based on theoretical content and will show areas needing development and expansion in this inductively designed scheme.

Dr. Saba recently joined the faculty of Georgetown University, where she is teaching integration of computer technology as part of the nursing curriculum. She has been employed as a nurse consultant in the Division of Nursing, U.S. Public Health Service, and for nearly 15 years has been active in interfacing computer technology

with nursing. She has conducted workshops and lectures for nursing educators, researchers, practitioners and administrators focusing on using computers in educational, institutional and community health facilities.

Dr. Saba initiated the annual conferences on computer technology and nursing at the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Bethesda, Maryland, as well as the nursing sessions for the Annual Symposium on Computer Applications in Medical Care (SCAMC). She started the Nursing Special Interest Group that meets during SCAMC, and is on the Executive Committee of the American Nurses' Association's Council of Computer Applications in Nursing. She has also taught one of the first academic courses on this topic at NIH's Graduate School.

Dr. Saba has served on various national and international committees such as those of the Public Health Service, Health Care Financing Administration, National League for Nursing, American Nurses' Association and World Health Organization; she is a member of several national professional nursing and public health organizations. In 1977 she received the Public Health Service

Commendation medal for her contribution in the design and implementation of manpower and management information system studies.

Dr. Saba initiated the Nursing Component of the National Health Planning Information Center (NHPIC), Bureau of Health Planning. She has directed numerous national surveys in the field of community health and research projects which involved using computer technology in nursing care.

She is senior author of a book Essentials of Computers for Nurses (1986) published by J. B. Lippincott Co. She is on the editorial board of the journal, Computers in Nursing, and author of articles appearing in Nursing Outlook, American Journal of Nursing, and Public Health Reports.

She holds a Bachelor of Science degree with a major in nursing from Skidmore College; a Master of Arts in Public Health Education from Teachers College, Columbia University; and, from American University, Washington, D.C. a Master of Science in Computer Technology of Management, and a Doctor of Education in Scientific and Technical Information Science.

# NEWS STAT

- The American Cancer Society (ACS) and the American heart and lung associations have initiated a program, "Toward a Tobacco-Free Young America," under which goals have been set to eliminate the tobacco threat among youth by the year 2000. "Children entering the kindergarten class of 1987 could be the first to graduate from high school as a tobacco-free generation," the American Cancer Society's newly released annual report states. (American Medical News (AMN), April 10, 1987)
- Statisticians have tracked an increase in suicides among young people since the 1950s. "In young adults, the rates are almost twice as high," said Jim Mercy, Chief of the Intentional Injuries Section at the Centers for Disease Control, in Atlanta. Young adults 20 to 24 face twice the risk as the 15- to 19-year olds." Suicide now ranks second behind accidents as a killer of Americans 15 to 24 years old. (AMN, April 10, 1987)
- A General Accounting Office (GAO) report on the Medicare home health benefit reports 3.2 million elderly face one or more limitations in their activities of daily living, and only 60% of those are receiving the needed assistance from relatives, friends, paid household aides or visiting health care workers. GAO analysis of the 1982 long term care survey found that those chronically ill elderly not receiving assistance were more likely to be seriously disabled, female, senile or retarded than the group of elderly who received all the necessary assistance. (Capital Update, Feb. 13, 1987, ANA Washington Office)
- Committee staffers in both the House and the Senate are drafting legislative proposals which seek to reform the nation's nursing home industry. The pending legislative drafts incorporate some of the recommendations set forth in the Institute of Medicine's study on nursing homes that was published in March 1986. Major issues in the reform proposals are nurse staffing requirements, nurses'-aide training, resident assessments, reimburse-

- ment and enforcement. Provisions of primary concern to the ANA are the issues of nurse staffing, aide training and resident assessment. (*Capital Update*, Feb. 13, 1987, ANA Washington Office)
- New guidelines on the use of the most common categories of diagnostic tests have been announced by the Blue Cross and Blue Shield Assn. and the American College of Physicians. These guidelines are expected to save a significant amount of money. Blues President Bernard R. Tresnowski said estimates as to how many tests are necessary "range from 20% to 60%. If these estimates are accurate, we are spending \$6 to \$18 billion a year on procedures which do not aid in the diagnosis or treatment of illness." (AMN, April 10, 1987)
- Between 1970 and 1980, the suicide rate for young Americans inexplicably leaped 40%, according to a report issued in February by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The CDC indicated that a 50% hike in the rate of suicide among young men—from 13.5 to 20.2 per 100,000, fueled the big increase. In the same period, the rate increased only 2% for young women—from 4.2 to 4.3 per 100,000. Social scientists have speculated that increasing family breakups, drug abuse, dwindling job and educational opportunities, and greater availability of guns could be factors. (AMN, March 6, 1987)
- Georgetown U. School of Dentistry in Washington, D.C., the largest private dental school in the country, says it will phase out its dental education program during the next three years because of a decreasing applicant pool whose academic quality is declining. Dental schools across the country are recording a steep drop in the number of applicants. Giant strides against tooth decay and advances in dental care have changed the needs of the public, resulting in a lessened demand for this service. (AMN, April 17, 1987)

The address will be presented by Virginia Saba, RN, EdD, Graduate Faculty, Georgetown University School of Nursing, Washington, D.C.

Sigma Theta Tau's International Classification System is based upon areas of interest and investigation of more than 3,600 nurse researchers worldwide. The content-specific themes originated from researchers' responses to a survey of areas of investigation, study populations and theoretical frameworks for research. The purpose is to provide a systematic way of organizing knowledge for nursing development, utilization and dissemination.

A well-known nursing information systems expert who has utilized the system in classifying major research grants, Dr. Saba will provide an overview of the system as well as a critique and recommendations for future use. She will address the need for nursing knowledge based on theoretical content and will show areas needing development and expansion in this inductively designed scheme.

Tickets will be on sale during the NLN Convention; the ticket price is \$16. (It is not necessary to be registered for NLN in order to attend this luncheon.)



# Campaign Pledges Exceed \$1.4 Million

A Lilly Endowment, Inc., challenge grant of \$750,000 and generous member investments have elevated the Knowledge Building Campaign gifts and pledges total to more than \$1.4 million.

As of mid-April, \$145,000 had been pledged by members as a result of the mail invitation from National Campaign Chair Lucie Kelly, \$95,000 had been received through the Major Gifts Division, \$32,000 from chapters, \$48,000 was committed by corporations, and \$750,000 from foundations. (The average member gift from the mail invitation is approximately \$150.)

Campaign Chair Lucie Kelly states, "We anticipate that the campaign total will soon exceed \$2 million. Sigma Theta Tau Inter-

national expects announcements of several major grants, and is daily inviting support from key individuals, corporations and foundations throughout the nation. The momentum of the campaign is rapidly accelerating. This is a very exciting time in the development of the International Nursing Library and Center for Nursing Scholarship."

The \$750,000 gift of the Lilly Endowment, Inc., will be contributed on a \$1-for-\$1 matching basis to Sigma Theta Tau for the International Center for Nursing Scholarship. Contributions associated with the challenge grant "must be secured from sources not related to the professional nursing community, i.e., corporations, founda-

tions and individuals." Michael A. Carroll, Vice President for Community Development for the Endowment, informed Sigma Theta Tau President Vernice Ferguson, "We are pleased to be in partnership with your fine organization on this exciting project."

According to President Ferguson, the Lilly Endowment, Inc. was instrumental in advancing the concept of the International Center. Their initial grant provided for the 1985 member survey to determine members' needs and wishes regarding Center and Library services, a philanthropic market study to examine the society's fundraising potential, and an architectural analysis to design the first phase of the project.

## Gala Luncheon Kicks-Off Indianapolis Knowledge Building Campaign

More than 60 representatives of Indianapolis businesses, health-service organizations, educational institutions and foundations attended a luncheon on March 31 at the historic Circle Theatre (also the site of a Sigma Theta Tau rush party on October 13, 1925) to kick off the Indianapolis portion of the Knowledge Building Campaign.

Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., Indianapolis Campaign Co-Chair (along with Dr. Elizabeth Grossman, Dean of the Indiana University School of Nursing) presided over the gathering. Dr. Irwin announced the campaign's progress and the \$750,000 challenge grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. President Vernice Ferguson, National Campaign Chair Lucie Kelly, and Executive Officer Nell Watts informed those present of plans for the International Center and Library, campaign leadership and goals of

the society.



# Celebrate Worldwide Nursing Scholarship

Worldwide nursing scholarship will be the focus of Sigma Theta Tau's Biennial Convention November 9-13, 1987 in San Francisco. "Celebrate Worldwide Nursing Scholarship" is the theme of the meeting, which will focus on worldwide nursing scholarship in relation to practice, nursing policy, research utilization and theory.

Scientific Sessions will open the convention. Afaf Meleis, RN, PhD, FAAN, Professor, Department of Mental Health and Community Nursing, School of Nursing, University of California-San Francisco, will keynote the Scientific Sessions Program. Dr. Meleis, the internationally known author of Theoretical Nursing: Development and Progress, has taught meta-theory nursing for 20 years and has presented in Sweden, Japan, Egypt, Bahrain and many other countries. She has acted as a consultant to international research projects conducted in Kuwait, Egypt, Sweden and Saudi Arabia. Opportunities to act as a visiting professor have also taken her to Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Sweden, Japan and Brazil.

Dr. Meleis is one of 29 Kellogg International Fellows who represent 18 countries. Her work is focusing on identifying health care needs in developing countries. She is focusing on Middle Eastern and South American women in their own home countries and as immigrants to the United States.

On Tuesday evening, November 10, convention participants will be invited to attend a reception focusing on nursing and the public it serves. Community leaders will be invited to the reception, which has two honorary hosts—the Honorable Dianne Feinstein, Mayor, City of San Francisco, and John Lo Schiavo, S.J., President of the University of San Francisco.

Program Sessions will be held on Wednesday, November 11. Margretta Styles, RN, EdD, FAAN, President of the American Nurses Association, will keynote the program followed by a panel response. The panel will focus on the meaning of worldwide nursing scholarship in relation to practice, nursing policy, research utilization and theory. Some of the highlights of the program are nursing success stories-nursing's resolutions to international health issues through the rich and diverse roles of nurses, and special sessions on nursing informatics; theory and science; and marketing, design and distribution of nursing products. Mentors in nursing will also be highlighted.

Leadership Sessions will be held on Thursday, November 12. This is an opportunity for 221 chapters to network as they move into a new era of international involvement in providing scholarly leadership in bringing forth the Center for Nursing Scholarship. At this convention, Sigma Theta Tau will address the first honor societies outside of the U.S.A. that are petitioning to join the organization.

The biennial meeting of the House of Delegates will close the week's activities. The House of Delegates provides an opportunity for chapters and leaders to report their activities for the past biennium and to plan for 1988-89. Officers will be elected, petitions for new chapters will be approved, honorary members will be inducted, and program priorities will be established. Special events on the Convention schedule include receptions for Founders' Award winners and for new Honorary Members, a banquet to honor Founders' Award recipients and a luncheon for winners of the Media Awards.

Convention participants are encouraged to take advantage of the weekend before or after the convention to enjoy the many sights and attractions of San Francisco and the surrounding areas. Information will be available beforehand and on-site for those who are interested in participating in tours.

Registration is available for each day and each social event separately as well as for the entire convention. November 2 is the preconvention registration deadline. On-site registration will continue as long as space is available.



The next qualifying examination for nurses educated in foreign countries who wish to practice as professional nurses in the United States will be held October 7, 1987 at 37 locations in 26 countries throughout the world, including seven in the United States.

The Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools (CGFNS), which administers the screening program, announced that all applications and supporting documentation are required by

CGFNS in Philadelphia by July 1, 1987. CGFNS expects more than 8000 nurses to take the October exam.
