Knowledge without integrity is dangerous and dreadful

Integrity is foundational to the nurse's role and responsibility.

Integrity is doing the right thing when no one is watching

Integrity and Nursing

 Nursing is the most trusted profession...BUT... 58% of nursing students self-reported a dishonest behavior (McCabe, 2009)

Dishonest Behaviors

- Antecedents:
 - High stakes environment of higher education
 - Normative support for dishonest behaviors
 - Student self-reported reasons:
 - Lack of time
 - Making other proud
 - Getting into graduate school
 - Didn't know where to start
 - competition
- Consequences:
 - Educational institutions are the gatekeeper of the profession
 - Students who engage in academic dishonesty are more likely to practice dishonestly (Harper 2006)

Academic Integrity

A commitment to fundamental values, even in the face of adversity

- Honesty Practicing intellectual and personal honesty in learning, teaching, research and service.
- **Trus**t Fostering of a climate of mutual trust in order to stimulate the free exchange of ideas which in turn allows scholarly inquiry to reach its fullest potential.
- **Fairness** Establishing clear and transparent expectations, standards, and practices to support fairness in the interactions of students, faculty, and administrators.
- Respect Acknowledging the interactive, cooperative and participatory nature of learning and valuing diverse opinions and ideas
- Responsibility -Recognizing personal accountability coupled with the willingness of individuals and groups to lead by example, uphold mutually agreed-upon standards, and take action when they encounter wrongdoing.
- Courage Doing what is right even in the face of adversity or personal risk.

Academic Dishonesty

An act to gain an advantage greater than others

- Cheating using unauthorized material in an academic exercise or having another person do the work for you
- Fabrication inventing or falsifying information
- Facilitating Helping others commit an act of dishonesty
- Plagiarism Using the words or ideas of another without attribution
- Multiple submissions Using work from a previous activity as if it were new and original work
- Deception Misrepresenting work, records or credentials. Includes taking credit for group work when one did not contribute to the end product

A choice grounded in personal gain

Strategies

The goal is not punishment but creation of a community where intellectual integrity prevails

- Role model integrity
- Demonstrate the behavior you want to see in your students
- Keep it fresh
- Recycled assignments get recycled responses
- Make it meaningful
 - Learning opportunities not busy work
- Build towards an outcome
- Sequence activities towards a valued outcome
- Set the bar high and mean it
- Expect high standards of behavior
- Meaningful feedback
 - Support growth and development

Significance

- A paradigm shift from catching and punishing cheaters to promoting and modeling integrity is needed.
- Academic integrity impacts learning, behavior and professionalism
