"Enable Others to Act"

- Treats colleagues with dignity and respect
- Supports the decisions that people make on their own

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TEAM LEADERSHIP PROJECT

Background

- NP faculties are responsible for assuring graduates meet the stringent clinical competencies of the profession.
- Assessment of clinical decision-making is one aspect in the evaluation of student clinical competencies.

Purpose

- Purpose of this project: to foster leadership development of a novice faculty nurse educator through the process of leading a team project.
- The team created an online clinical evaluation scenario on the e-learning "Story-Board" platform as a means of assessing student integration of clinical knowledge in a primary care course.

Outcomes

- Project was presented at National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties (NONPF) in April 2015.
- E-learning platform is easily modified by faculty to add new cases.
- Satisfaction of NP students and usefulness in the evaluation of student clinical thinking will make this a sustainable project.
