Purpose

Significance

Significance

- Distance learning (DL) continued to increase,
 6.52% from fall 2011 to fall 2012 (although that is a decrease from fall 2007 to fall 2008 when distance learning grew by 22%).
- Traditional face-to-face enrollment decreased by 2.64% (Instructional Technology Council (ITC), 2013).

Significance

- Student demand for DL continues to grow (RN to BSN, BSN to MSN/DNP/PhD programs).
- Urgent need for course quality and design as well as for faculty education.
- Completion rates are narrowing between DL and face-to-face (f2f) students.

 - Education of older students.
