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

Unique Veteran Health Issues

- Chronic pain
- Post Traumatic Stress
 Disorder (PTSD)
- Military Sexual Trauma (MST)
- Homelessness

- Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI)
- Polytrauma
- Hazardous exposures
- Substance abuse disorders
- Suicide



VA Nursing Academic Partnerships (VANAP)

- Developed by Department of Veterans Affairs, Office of Academic Affiliations
- 17 VANAP-Undergraduate (VANAP-U) partnerships across the country
- Addresses a growing population of veterans with unique and complex care needs
- Aims to expand the workforce of BSN-prepared nurses educated in veteran care and able to provide quality nursing services that improve patient outcomes and reduce cost of care



Process

- Collaboration among school of nursing and VA stakeholders
- Review of literature to identify veteran care concerns
- Development of VANAP scholar competencies
- Identification of gaps in curriculum and areas for clinical improvement
- Integration of veteran content in all courses
- Implementation of improvement projects and teaching strategies


