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

As Secretariat, we will ensure that these issues remain in focus and are acted upon, and ideally, resolved.

We look forward to continuing these important discussions at major upcoming events in 2017. In addition to the 70th World Health Assembly to be held in Geneva, Switzerland from 22–31 May, the International Council of Nurses holds its Biennial Congress in Barcelona, Spain, May 27–June 1, 2017 while the International Confederation of Midwives has its 31st Triennial Congress in Toronto, Canada, June 18-22. Side meetings for representatives of the GNWHOCCs will be organised at these events.

GENERAL MEETING

AND 11TH BIENNIAL NURSING AND MIDWIFERY CONTRIBUTION TOWARDS GLOBAL HEALTH

The General Meeting of the Global Network World Health Organization Collaborating Centres for Nursing and Midwifery (GN WHO CC) was held on Saturday 30th July 2016, at the Glasgow Caledonian University, Scotland. This meeting was held alongside the 11th Biennial WHO Collaborating Centres for Nursing and Midwifery conference Strategic Conversations: The Nursing and Midwifery Contribution towards Global Health 2030, 27th–29th July 2016.

Seventy members, partners and colleagues attended the meeting, with 29 WHO Collaborating Centres (WHO CCs). Reports were given from the 6 WHO regions of the world (34 WHO CCs registered but 5 were unable to attend due to visa and travel issues). Senior representatives from WHO Geneva and AMRO, AFRO, EMRO, EURO WHO regional and country offices, and GN WHO CC partner organisations International Council of Nurses (ICN), International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) and Sigma Theta Tau International (STTI), also attended.

The Secretary General of the GN WHO CC **Professor John Daly** (Dean, Faculty of Health, University of Technology Sydney (UTS), formally opened the meeting, welcoming members followed by brief introductions.

SECRETARIAT REPORT 2014-2016

The GN WHO CC Assistant Secretary General **Ms Michele Rumsey** presented a Secretariat Report 2014–2016 which covered a summary of activities, an overview of the finances required to undertake the Secretariat role including an outline of data that have been collected from all the WHO CCs on their Terms of Reference (TOR) and projects. This information will assist the GNWHOCCs to develop a better understanding of global work being undertaken, links to current strategies and potential future collaborations.

COLLABORATING CENTRES UPDATE 2016-2020

Attending Collaborating Centres provided a brief update on their current TOR, projects, research; future strategies and links with WHO SDNM 2016–2020. This will be included in the full report.



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Common challenges reported by many CCs were lack of time, personnel and financial resources. There are many opportunities for collaborative work but this is difficult to undertake without funding. Discussions were held on the role of WHOCCs to operate within their regions on mandated WHO TOR work. It was also discussed how this could be balanced with other regional and global work that give the WHOCC their expertise. It was however recognised that all work needed to follow member state WHO mandated resolutions and strategies.

Updates were also provided by the three Global Network partners: ICN-Dr Frances Hughes, CEO; ICM-Frances Day Stirk, President; and STTI-Cynthia Vlasich, Director of Global Initiatives.

UPDATE OF THE ICM'S ESSENTIAL COMPETENCIES FOR BASIC MIDWIFERY PRACTICE

ver the past 12 months, the International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) has been undertaking a project to update the ICM's Essential Competencies for basic midwifery practice. These were last updated in 2013 and need to be updated regularly to be sure that they reflect changes in midwifery practice locally and internationally. The latest update is being conducted by a team of researchers led by **Professor Michelle** Butler at the University of British Columbia (UBC) in Canada, working with a wider Core Working Group comprising members of the ICM's ESC Competencies and Standards Section, the ICM Board and midwifery education leaders across ICM's regions.

The WHO Collaborating Centres are well represented in this important project. As part of the UTS WHO Collaborating Centre and the UTS Centre for Midwifery, Child and Family Health, Professor Caroline Homer and Associate Professor Lorena Binfa of the WHO Collaborating Centre for Development of Midwifery at the University of Chile, Santiago have both been part of the Core Working Group.

This has been an exciting project with widespread consultation across all the ICM member associations and partners across the globe. An extensive literature review was initially undertaken and this was followed by three rounds of a Delphi project to clarify the essential competencies. A report on the project will be presented at the ICM Council meeting which is held prior to the ICM Congress in Toronto in June 2017.

The Core Working Group and a wider group of partners met in Geneva in February 2017. The purpose of the meeting was to review the development thus far and provide feedback and advice and to help with the implementation of the project.

GLOBAL HEALTH WORKFORCE NETWORK (GHWN)

AND INTERNATIONAL HEALTH PARTNERSHIP MEETINGS FOR UNIVERSAL HEALTH COVERAGE

Sabera Turkmani represented UTS at the Global Health Workforce Network (GHWN) and the International Health Partnership Meetings for Universal Health Coverage (UHC) 2030, followed by a High Level Ministerial Meeting on Health Employment and Economic Growth. The event was held in Geneva, Switzerland, 12–15 December 2016, hosted jointly by the International Labour Organization (ILO), Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), and the World Health Organization (WHO).

The meeting was an opportunity to introduce the Global Health Workforce Network (GHWN), framed within the broader context of the WHO Global Strategy on Human Resources for Health and the High-Level Commission on Health Employment and Economic Growth. A participatory consultation with policy makers and other constituencies regarding the GHWN's scope of work and operations was also held to inform high-level political engagement and intersectoral and multilateral policy dialogue. This included provision of a forum for multi-sector and multi stakeholder agenda setting, sharing of best practices, and harmonisation and alignment of international support to HRH.

This meeting brought together governments, including the ministers of education, finance, health, labour and foreign affairs; employers, health worker associations and unions, civil society, global initiatives, agencies and multilateral organisations, regional organisations, financing institutions and the private sector engaged in health, education, youth, gender equality, decent work, and inclusive economic growth.

GLOBAL ALLIANCE FOR NURSING AND MIDWIFERY (GANM) EXPANDS TO 4000 MEMBERS

To overcome barriers to obtaining information, the Global Alliance for Nursing and Midwifery (GANM), a PAHO/WHO Collaborating Center (CC) at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing (JHSON) created an online library to provide free, open-access information to its members.

FREE ONLINE LIBRARY

Technological and financial barriers limit the translation of research to practice (Raman, 2015). In order to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), access to information, the latest research, and evidence based policy and practice guidelines, is crucial for nurses and midwives around the world. To overcome barriers to obtaining information, the Global Alliance for Nursing and Midwifery (GANM), a PAHO/WHO Collaborating Center (CC) at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing (JHSON) created an online library to provide free, openaccess information to its members. Studies have shown that it is feasible to provide access to resources via mobile technology to nurses and midwives and this is an effective mode of knowledge dissemination (Fisher & Fingenbaum, 2015). The GANM library is organized by theme around the SDG 3 targets. The aim is for the library to serve as a guide for capacity building, education, training, and creating links between the GANM community and health professionals worldwide including other WHO CCs, professional associations, and regulatory bodies. The library is designed to serve as the foundation for GANM Knowledge Gateway activities, linking with the discussion board, blog site, video blogs, webinars, and social media campaigns. Through the new organisation and development of the virtual online library, the JHUSON CC aims to increase GANM membership and expand the number of open-access resources available to practitioners to advance knowledge dissemination and achievement of the SDGs

The Global Alliance for Nursing and Midwifery (GANM) is a World Health Organization (WHO)/Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) Collaborating Center (CC) at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing (JHSON). The GANM's aim is to develop innovative approaches to knowledge dissemination that build the capacity of nurses and midwives around the world. Currently the GANM has nearly 4,000 members consisting of practitioners, policymakers, researchers, and academics from 161 countries. The GANM uses its Knowledge Gateway to facilitate and promote equitable access to information and scientific knowledge to promote and support global nursing and midwifery communities of practice with the ultimate goal of meeting the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Globally, nurses and midwives are the largest professional group in the health system. The care provided by nurses is essential to

achieve the SDGs to deliver quality, effective, and safe care. Not having access to the latest evidence-based approaches to care delivery poses significant challenges to the profession and risk to patient safety. Especially as we consider the global demand for healthcare and the current human resources for health crisis (HRH), nurses must have access to the latest research, policy, and practice guidelines. Access to information and technical expertise can be fragmented and costly especially for nurses and midwives in low-resource settings.

In 2006, the GANM launched its Knowledge Gateway, creating a virtual community of practice and since then has grown its membership and activities. The GANM moderates a discussion board, blog site, online library, hosts webinars, initiates social media campaigns, and provides a membership list to incentivize collaboration. The GANM uses low-band width technology to

ensure that all members are able to access and use its services. Additionally, annual surveys engage the GANM community and ensure we are creating an appropriate platform that provides necessary resources to facilitate knowledge dissemination and exchange of best practices.

Growing from a small community of practice in 2006, the GANM now has nearly 4,000 members from 161 countries. The discussion board has generated 3,896 contributions on a wide range of issues confronting

nursing and midwifery. Topics have included; respectful maternity care, episiotomy guidelines, nurses' security, and the response to epidemics like Ebola and Zika. When the SDGs were released in January 2016, the GANM aligned its blog site to recruit contributors to address each of the SDG 3 targets. Similarly the GANM's library is organized by theme of each target of SDG 3 to provide members access to the latest information to work toward health equity across cultures and languages globally.

Through leveraging technology and technical expertise globally, the GANM serves as an exemplary model that provides an innovative, cost effective way to exchange and share knowledge and best practices with nurses and midwives around the world in limited and low resources settings.

NURSING AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

Nursing's core is rooted in social justice, recognising health and well-being as a universal human right. With shifting health concerns and growing health inequities among and within countries, all nurses need the skills to understand and address complex social justice principles which are fundamental to professional practice.

Embracing the School's core values of excellence, respect, diversity, integrity, and accountability, the PAHO/WHO Collaborating Centre (CC) for Nursing Knowledge, Information Management & Sharing at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing (JHSON) recently focused on health care workers in conflict areas, working with students, faculty, and staff to raise awareness and support.

In order to address health challenges globally and bring attention to these complex social justice issues, the CC and JHSON have $\,$

TRANSFORMING NURSING EDUCATION IN GUYANA

Collaborative partnership strengthens Guyana's nursing schools

In November 2016, twenty-six Guyana nurse educators completed the University of Miami School of Nursing and Health Studies' (UM SONHS') hybrid Certificate in Nursing Education program. Facilitators combined online learning with on-site face-to-face instruction by UM nursing faculty who travelled to Guyana five times during the 4 courses. Participants were all nursing graduates interested in being clinical instructors in Guyana's nursing schools.

The Certificate in Nursing Education is a partnership between the SONHS' PAHO/WHO Collaborating Centre, Guyana's Ministry of Health, and the Pan American Health Organization's (PAHO) Subregional Office in Guyana. UM SONHS faculty first conducted a baseline assessment of the Guyana nursing tutors' educational needs and used this data to customize course content to specific challenges facing nursing educators on the island nation.

Drs Mary Mckay and **Deborah Salani**, the two UM nursing faculty who facilitated the course, are appreciative of the Guyana nursing

faculty they taught. "Their positivity, enthusiasm and passion for education and for nursing come through. What they're able to accomplish within a limited-resource system speaks to the dedication of these nursing educators," said **Dr Mckay**.

The course helped alleviate Guyana's severe nursing faculty shortage by teaching participants to deliver competent nursing instruction using best practices, and by building their capacity to train other faculty—thus increasing the pool of teaching faculty and promoting systemic and sustainable improvements in Guyana's nursing education infrastructure.

Course participants represented Guyana's four schools of nursing, and included experienced as well as early career teachers. "To achieve sustainability, we must equip younger people with the nursing instruction skills to become tomorrow's leaders and help Guyana nursing education chart its own future," said **Dr Johis Ortega**, UM SONHS Associate Dean for Master's Programs and Global Initiatives and Director of the school's PAHO/WHO Collaborating Centre.



HELPING HAITI

 $S^{\text{oon after Hurricane Matthew devastated Haiti, University of } \\ Miami School of Nursing and Health Studies (SONHS) students$ and faculty sprang into action. The SONHS team is already familiar with the impoverished Caribbean nation. Since March of 2013 Dr Johis Ortega, Associate Dean for Master's programs and global initiatives and Deputy Director of the school's PAHO/WHO Collaborating Centre, has led teams of advanced practice nursing students and other healthcare professionals on biannual missions to Thomonde, a rural area in Haiti's central plateau underserviced by other Haiti relief agencies. The University of Miami teams provide healthcare services, supplies and medications to the impoverished region's populace. They also facilitate education and training in primary care delivery for Haitian nurses, physicians and other local community health workers.

Upon hearing the news of Hurricane Matthew, plans for the group's next scheduled trip to Haiti went into high gear. One doctor of nursing practice student contacted local aviation authorities to successfully waive shipment fees for the large load of medical and relief supplies that the SONHS team utilized and distributed during their October 26-30 visit to the Western hemisphere's poorest country. Meanwhile, nurse practitioner students launched "Go Fund Me" pages to raise money for needed items such as vitamins, anti-fungal gels, lightweight dried foods, diapers, clothing, blankets, and ibuprofen.

"Though we travel to Haiti with our students three times a year, those affected by Hurricane Matthew needed our help now more than ever. The SONHS is committed to helping the Haitian community and to helping develop the skills of the Haitian healthcare workforce," said Ortega.

The WHO Collaborating Centre at Glasgow Caledonian University currently performs a co-ordinating Secretariat function for the European WHO region. We were delighted to attend a regional meeting of WHO CCs and the European Forum of National Nursing & Midwifery Associations (EFNNMA), in Berlin, Germany, 2–3rd March 2017. Recognising the opportunities and challenges for strengthening the nursing and midwifery contribution to healthcare across Europe, the focus of the meeting was on the development of a European Framework for Action in response to the WHO Global Strategy for Human Resources for Health: Workforce 2030 and the UN High Level Commission on Health Employment and Economic Growth.
