Evaluation of the Impact of American Association of Nurse Practitioners' Health Policy Conference Participation on Self-assessment of Political Astuteness Crystal Ché Williams, BSN, RN

Purpose


 To measure the impact of participation in a health policy conference and face-to-face meetings with Federal House and or Senate Representatives on perceived political astuteness among attendees of the American Association of Nurse Practitioners' 2018 Health Policy Conference.

Background

- Evidence-based strategies, for increasing *Political Astuteness* and engagement among nurses are needed.
- Political Astuteness is a comprehensive term entailing an awareness, understanding, knowledge, and involvement in legislative and political processes and health care policy (Primomo & Björling, 2013).
- Approximately 34% of nurses are currently engaged in public policy (Oden et al., 2000).
- Less than 25% of nurse practitioners report being engaged in political activities (O'Rourke et al., 2017).
- Nurse practitioners have reported low internal and external political efficacy (O'Rourke et al., 2017; Sharoni, 2012).
- Participation in state nursing legislative days shows potential as a strategy for increasing *Political Astuteness* (Primomo & Björling, 2013).

Methods

- Pre-post descriptive program evaluation design
- Modified Political Astuteness Inventory survey

Discussion

- McNemar's test showed a positive and statistically significant difference pre- and post- conference participation for 17 of 34 questions included in the final analysis.
- The results of this survey-based program evaluation are consistent with previous studies and suggest that participation in a health policy conference, in combination with face-to-face meetings with Federal House and or Senate Representatives, may increase perceptions of *Political Astuteness* among nurses.

Limitations

- High levels of *Political Astuteness* prior to conference participation cannot be ruled out and could potentially impact the magnitude of any change in *Political Astuteness* among participants.
- Selected questions on the *Modified Political Astuteness Inventory* tool were not included in the final analysis based on the projected feasibility or likelihood of changes in *Political Astuteness* between the pre- and post- conference periods.
